

Mark Bee is an associate professor in the Department of Ecology, Evolution, and Behavior at the University of Minnesota, where he is also a faculty member in the Graduate Program for Neuroscience and the Center for Applied and Translational Sensory Science (catss.umn.edu). He earned his Ph.D. in 2001 from the University of Missouri working with Carl Gerhardt on acoustic communication in frogs. He was a postdoc from 2001 to 2005 at the Universität Oldenburg, where he worked with Georg Klump on the neural mechanisms of auditory processing in songbirds. His research program investigates the mechanisms, function, and evolution of hearing and sound communication in nonhuman animals. A major objective of his research is to discover the signal processing strategies by which nonhuman animals solve analogs of the human cocktail party problem that require extracting biologically critical information from vocal signals under the adverse listening conditions found in noisy social environments.
