



Bev Wright is a professor in the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders and director of the Knowles Hearing Center at Northwestern University. Her primary research interest is in auditory perceptual learning: the improvement in auditory skills with practice. She and her coworkers investigate the factors that induce this learning, with the goal of developing more effective perceptual training strategies to aid rehabilitation and promote skill enhancement. She also maintains an interest in auditory deficits associated with language-based learning disorders, the detection of auditory signals in background noise, and the distribution of attention in auditory detection tasks. Dr. Wright has a Ph.D. in experimental psychology from the University of Texas at Austin (mentor: Dennis McFadden), and did postdoctoral research at the University of Florida (mentor: David Green) and the University of California San Francisco (mentor: Mike Merzenich) before joining the faculty at Northwestern University in 1997. She is a recipient of the R. Bruce Lindsay Award from the Acoustical Society of America, a two-time recipient of the Clarence Simon Award for Outstanding Teaching and Mentoring in the School of Communication at Northwestern, and is a Fellow of the Acoustical Society of America.
